

Montclair is a traditional comprehensive high school offering three small learning communities in the residential community of 41,000 people of Essex County, NJ. Our small learning communities consist of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics), CGI (Civics and Government Institute), and CSI (Center for Social Justice). Our four-year college preparatory program offers Advanced Placement as well as options in honors and high honors. Additionally, Montclair HS offers dual enrollment opportunities with Montclair State University (MADE), Seton Hall University and Kean University. ### Class Periods/Course Credit

Prior to the 19-20 School Year: Montclair HS operated on an eight-period day where students were enrolled in seven courses at a time. Classes met 44 minutes per day. Students had the opportunity to earn additional credits by taking zero period, or a ninth period elective.

19-20 School Year: Montclair HS adopted a double-rotating drop schedule. Students are enrolled in eight classes at a time with a community lunch. Classes meet for 52 minutes per day.

Credit is awarded at the end of the course; 36 weeks for yearlong courses and 18 weeks for semester courses. All courses earn 5 credits except for semester courses which earn 1.25 credits. Advanced science courses which earn 1.25 credits. Advanced science courses are awarded 6 credits because they have an additional laboratory period. Note: 5 or 6 credits = 1 credit year. Students enrolled in CGI, CSI, and STEM learning communities are required to take an additional academic elective which impedes their ability to take other courses outside the required curriculum.

### Grading Scale A = 90 - 100

B = 80 - 89 C = 70 - 79 D = 60 - 69 F = 0 - 59

### GPA

All courses are included in the grade point average calculations except transfer grades from other educational institutions or programs, audited courses, and pass/fail courses. Summer School courses are included in the GPA if the student has repeated the course. GPA is calculated on a weighted 4.0 scale. Honors courses are designated with "H," High Honors courses are designated with "HH" and Advanced Placement courses are designated with "AP". All designations appear after the course. GPA is calculated using the grid below.

### **Graduation Requirements**

All students are required to complete a minimum of 122 credits and demonstrate proficiency in both English Language Arts and Mathematics in one of the approved state assessments. This will earn them a general diploma.

## School Profile Analysis


- Average SAT scores have increased every year
  - Over 100 points since 2015
    - **2018-2019 MHS Average 1231**
    - **2018-2019** NJ State Average 1089
- Average GPA scores have steadily increased with a slight decline from 2018 to 2019
- While student body sizes have remained similar, the number of student applications to colleges has rapidly increased
  - o 777 more applications in 2019 than in 2015
  - Nearly a 100 more applications each year
  - Application per student rate has increased 1.2 applications per student over 5 years
- Increased student applications = decreased college acceptance rates



### Regular and Rolling Application Statistics (n = 474)




## Class of 2019 Application Analysis

- 22% of the senior class applied Early Decision
- 45% of the senior class submitted at least 1 Early Action application
- 80% of the senior class submitted at least 1 Regular Decision Application
- By November 15th, 1,027 applications were submitted to colleges and universities on behalf of more than 50% of the MHS Senior Class




### Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU)



## Key Insights

- MHS Seniors are graduating with a post-secondary plan

- Significant increase in GPA, and SAT scores

- Matriculation rates at MHS remain high for all MHS students. Black/African American and Hispanic students have the highest rates of Career Education placements. White and Asian Students have the highest rates of twoand four-year college placements
- Early Action and Early Decision deadlines have placed significant demands on the counselors, teachers, students and parents to complete applications to more colleges, earlier than ever before


